Agendamodel - Humanity learning

Personalized learning in collaborative environment at Elementary school

Agendamodel is a schedule free, holistic, social learning model inspired by flipped classroom, mastery learning, individualized learning, group working and technology use. Students receive weekly and course agendas and they can choose the learning pace and the depth of learning. Students have the responsibility to evaluate their learning. The teacher's role is to support students' work. The model is connected with improved motivation, feeling of competence, and willingness to participate.

First Aid Poetry – learning at Årsta school

Twelve year old students from Årstaskolan in Stockholm present how they work, share and learn in school, by showing a project where they turn their most important thoughts, feelings and dreams into poems.

"Read some good poetry, relevant, touching, insightful. Take notes of your feelings, dreams and thoughts. Cut down on the unimportant stuff, build up the important. Turn into poetry. Share and listen. Practice. Grow better. We show a typical learning process and give examples of our poems and books, accessible from www.arstaskolan.se.

All started with class weblogs, as tools for co-operative learning and peer coaching. The school developed teaching, through a growing Årsta Hub of public resources. Learning at Årstaskolan grows in many ongoing creative projects. All start with something that matters, using a structured process, learning from others.
